

Robinson Tournament picks up steam

A light breeze flowed through the Sanborn Park tennis courts Thursday, as players enjoyed another round of matches during the 62nd annual Francis J. Robinson Memorial International Tennis Tournament.

Cortes was pushed to three games before finally prevailing in her match and taking a deep breath upon exiting the court.

"I thought it was a great match," she said with a smile. "It was really tough. For a second, I thought she was going to win. It was really tough. I hope to get better and to meet new people this week."

Not everyone at Sanborn Park was there to participate in tennis. Austin Paehlig showed up to root on his friend Christian Harris, who was scheduled to play in a doubles match. But as they waited for Harris' match, the two decided to square off in a friendly, albeit competi-

tive, game of table tennis on the side of the park courts, as they waited for the doubles match to begin.

"He's not into tennis," Harris said of Paehlig. "But he said he's good in ping-pong, so we had to play a game. I think it's cool they have a table here that we can play while we wait."


And what if Paehlig were to actually win?
