Pillon, who is also a tournament director, has his hands full all week just on running the tournament. Add playing in the tough open division, and it really makes for a tiring week.

"I wouldn't say I'm on top of my game," Pillon said with a laugh after defeating Ingles. "It's not easy being out here all day stressing about stuff in the heat and then going out and playing. It takes a toll mentally and physically."

Brozovich found his way into the finals with a semifinals win over Justin Sabourin. This time in the finals, Brozovich is looking to carry his mental strength through the last match of the week.

"I'm just a little more confident — but I don't know if a lot has changed with my game," Brozovich said. "I'm not as scared to come right up to the net."
