

Robinson Tournament expands food options

What's better than relaxing at Sanborn Park on a nice day and watching competitive tennis matches?

Probably not much, unless you are enjoying a smoothie from Kate's Downtown Cafe, BBQ from Jeff Cook's Big River BBQ or a chicken taco from Eli's Eats on the Streets' food truck.

This year's Francis J. Robinson Memorial International Tennis Tournament won't just be a draw because of the action on the court, but also the food available throughout the day.

"I've been playing in the Robinson for 27 years and even after moving to Montana we try to come back every other year," Robinson veteran Laura Wickens said. "There weren't any food options before.

"But now we have the Big River BBQ in the afternoon and it's great. It shows how important the tournament is to the community to have these local food options. Before, people would have to leave and get food. But now we can support local restaurants and even have healthy options as well."

The 60th version of the annual tournament continued Thursday with singles, doubles and mixed doubles. But along the way, players found a way to nourish themselves with the options available at Sanborn Park.

"It's really good food," Robinson player and tennis instructor Justin Sabourin said. "I had a chicken sandwich (from Eli's Eats on the Streets') that I had never had before. It was incredible. I think it's great that we have all of the healthy items along with some of the stuff I like to eat, like brats and hamburgers.

"I like to eat here. We get a pretty good crowd and the food options are something to look forward to."

Having food provided by local restaurants on-site simply seems to be part of the continued evolution of the tournament.

"Everyone knows Kate's smoothies and sandwiches, and some people come just to watch and grab food," tournament director Steve Pillon said. "Jeff is awesome with the BBQ and I had just read about (Eli's Eats on the Streets) and didn't know too much about it, but the food is really great."
